


Reflections & Prayers for the First Sunday of Lent

Readings for this Sunday

These are the readings for this Sunday which you may like to read in your bibles at home.

Genesis 9.8-17 1 Peter 3.18-22

Mark 1.9-15

In those days Jesus came from Nazareth of Galilee and was baptized by John in the Jordan. And just as he was coming up out of the water, he saw the heavens torn apart and the Spirit descending like a dove on him. And a voice came from heaven, 'You are my Son, the Beloved; with you I am well pleased.'

And the Spirit immediately drove him out into the wilderness. He was in the wilderness for forty days, tempted by Satan; and he was with the wild beasts; and the angels waited on him.

Now after John was arrested, Jesus came to Galilee, proclaiming the good news of God, and saying, 'The time is fulfilled, and the kingdom of God has come near; repent, and believe in the good news.'

Reflection from David Nye

Three years ago, a group of us from St Johns went on pilgrimage to the Holy Land. During our visit, we glimpsed the river Jordan, the river where Jesus was baptised by John the Baptist as we have just heard.

It was then that Jesus must have become aware of his very special relationship with God as he heard the voice that came from heaven saying "You are my beloved son: with you I am well pleased". Yet the revelation of God's plan did not lead to a triumphant journey into the promised land like Joshua's journey centuries before. For Jesus, it was a journey of hardship and humility leading first into the wilderness and temptation by Satan, to derision and hostility from those he came to save, and finally to Jerusalem and an apparent humiliating and agonising death on a cross.

It may seem odd to us but for Jesus, baptism itself meant a foretaste of his own death and resurrection. It meant that in his baptism, as he was plunged into the waters of the river, he was plunged into death but as he came out, he was filled with God's Holy Spirit as he heard those words of the father. Later, with his disciples, Jesus referred to his coming death and resurrection as a type of baptism. He challenged them by asking whether they too could go through this baptism with him; in other words, were they prepared for the pain and suffering that has to be endured before they shared in the new life that God offered.

In some ways, the OT story about Noah and the flood is also about baptism. God had created a wonderful world with everything that was needed to live and to enjoy life. Yet the people he created think they know better: they believe that they can do without God and do things their own way. Rather than destroy the disobedient people and start again, God chooses a single family and a pair of all living creatures. He tells Noah to build an enormous boat, so that they can all be saved from the great flood that will cover the earth. And cover the earth it does: yet Noah and his family survive. God brings them safely through the flood onto dry land and offers mankind a new start.

We can see the story of Noah as another aspect of baptism. Although the flood water destroyed the world, the water that floated the ark saved Noah and his family.

God's new creation started with Noah, continues with the baptism, crucifixion and resurrection of Jesus and continues even today. Through his death and resurrection, Jesus saves us from our sins, and leads us into new life and our own baptism unites us with Jesus. At our baptism, we entered into the death of Jesus but we were also raised to new life just as Jesus was raised to new life on Easter Day.

In the Holy Land, our eyes were opened to see for ourselves where our Lord had lived and taught, where he had been arrested, crucified, where he had been buried and where he had been raised. It was truly wonderful. But our eyes were also opened to the Holy land of today, sadly still a place of bitterness and strife and where the peace is fragile. For some, life is very tough.

As we journey through this season of Lent, we pray that our eyes may be opened each day to give thanks to our Saviour Jesus Christ, who created us and who has given us, through his love, an abundant world. Just like Noah, we live in a sinful and corrupt world and often we read, and sometimes we see, examples that must grieve our Lord. We ourselves are not blameless as we reflect on our own failures and weaknesses, the times when we have not loved God and not loved our neighbour, the times when we think we can do without God.

In these coming weeks we are invited to walk with our Lord through the despair and the darkness of this world until we see our Lord nailed to the cross on Good Friday. At times, like our Lord but in different ways, there will be hardship and pain and suffering for us. Indeed, many of us are have our own cross to bear in our struggles in day to day living. But we know that in the end, the light of Christ **will** prevail and on Easter Day we will see the empty tomb. Like Noah we are offered a new start. Our eyes will be opened to see that God in his infinite love and mercy has raised Christ from the dead and we too can share in that glorious resurrection to new life. Amen

Into the Wilderness: Lent 1

Week beginning 21st February – find a rock or some pebbles

Just between his baptism and the beginning of his adult ministry, Jesus went into the wilderness for 40 days, "to be tested".

Read the story of Jesus wandering in the desert - Luke 4:1-11



The Judean is a barren and rocky place. Hold the rock, feel its weight. I wonder ... Have you ever felt that you have been tested? When have you walked on hard, barren or stony ground? What have you learned there? What might you learn there?

Prayer: Holy God, help us when we walk through the difficult places in our lives. Help us to know that the closer we walk to you, the closer you will be to us. Amen.

Prayers for the beginning of Lent

Give us the courage to give up quarrels, strife and jealousy in our families, neighbourhoods and communities.

May the presence of the risen Jesus, his body once broken and now made whole, bring peace and direction as we live with one another.

Lord, meet us in the silence, give us strength and hear our prayer.

Give us the courage to give up our selfishness as we live for others, and to give time, care and comfort to the sick. May the wounded hands of Jesus bring his healing touch, and the light of his presence fill their rooms. Lord, meet us in the silence, give us strength and hear our prayer.

Give us the courage to give up our fear of death and to rejoice with those who have died in faith.

May the feet of the risen Lord Jesus, once nailed to the cross, walk alongside the dying and bereaved in their agony, and walk with us and all your Church through death to the gate of glory.

Lord, meet us in the silence, give us strength and hear our prayer, here and in eternity. Amen.

St John's Lent Eco-challenge 2021 17th February – 3rd April

The Eco-church team have devised a set of challenges for Lent. These are all connected with our theme of 'Caring for God's World'. There is a different topic each week, and you are encouraged to do two or three challenges each week, at the level that suits you. Several challenges have two levels. We include opportunities to appreciate the natural world, simple things you can do to save energy and water, ideas about recycling, and suggestions on how to reduce your 'carbon footprint'. We have included stars for you to tick/colour when you complete a challenge!

Week 1: Biodiversity (Feb 22nd – 28th)

- Keep a list of birds/insects/animals that you see or hear this week
 Apply something from the 'how green is your garden' article in the
 Parish Magazine, e.g. leave an area in your garden for wildlife, start a
 compost bin, buy peat-free compost, make a pond...
- Feed the birds / put up a bird nest box or bee hotel
- Reduce your use of single-use plastic by half this week
