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Readings for this Sunday

These are the readings for this Sunday which you may like to read in your bibles at home.

2 Kings: 4:42-44 Psalm 145:10-18 **Ephesians 3:14-21**

John 6:1-21 – The Feeding of the Five Thousand (I think most of you know it)

Ephesians 3: 14-21

For this reason I bow my knees before the Father, from whom every family in heaven and on earth takes its name. I pray that, according to the riches of his glory, he may grant that you may be strengthened in your inner being with power through his Spirit, and that Christ may dwell in your hearts through faith, as you are being rooted and grounded in love. I pray that you may have the power to comprehend, with all the saints, what is the breadth and length and height and depth, and to know the love of Christ that surpasses knowledge, so that you may be filled with all the fullness of God.

Now to him who by the power at work within us is able to accomplish abundantly far more than all we can ask or imagine, to him be glory in the church and in Christ Jesus to all generations, for ever and ever. Amen.

Reflection from Anne Edwards

A crowd of five thousand -v- five loaves and two fish — this is the packed lunch Andrew brought to Jesus. Can you imagine the reaction of the other disciples muttering in the background? Some could be sniggering, others with their mouths open, nudging one another and muttering "muppet"! For me the significance of this story, this miracle which is the only miracle

shared between all four Gospels (apart from the resurrection) is not the actual feeding of about 5,000 (I think this number just signifies a large number of people) but what God can do with the little we offer Him.

In six weeks' time, Tim and Sophy, and their two boys, will come into our midst, Tim as our new vicar. After this time of vacancy and the earthquake of Covid-19, life here at St John's has changed dramatically. Two years ago I doubt if we could have imagined ending our Sunday morning eucharist by filing out of the building and singing the hymn outdoors! So you see we can do things differently – and my challenge to all of us is "What can we offer to God, to Tim, to one another, to the community around us that will demonstrate God's love, not only within the community of St John's but also outside its doors?" and thus draw others to Christ, and encourage them to become His disciples.

God may be sowing the seed of an idea; there may be an itch that won't go away of something you feel is missing from life at St John's which you long to see happening. Speak up! If Andrew hadn't spotted the boy – or may be the boy showed Andrew his packed lunch (we don't know which way round it was) – and brought Jesus' attention to the meager portion of five buns and two fish, all those people would have gone away with rumbling tummies, very hungry. Andrew wouldn't have known how the bread and fish could have made a difference – we don't know how our thoughts, ideas, suggestions could make a difference. We just have to offer them to God and let Him take it from there.

Today there is a great hunger – a hunger for the meaning of life. People are asking the question "Why?" We know so much of the what, when, how, but the 'why' can only be known by turning to God and discovering his creative love, the love of Father, Son and Holy Spirit spilling out and spreading throughout creation, throughout the world.

In his letter to the Ephesians Paul spells it out – he wants his hearers to grasp all that God has done in Christ, that they will get the magnitude of God's love and hospitality as He rescues us and welcomes us into his family, to his table That is something we've had to do without for many months, and even now we have to be constrained – although at last many of the Covid-19 restrictions are lifting, we are still limiting our gatherings, keeping

our distance and wearing masks, no handshakes, no hugs, no friendly huddles. And even now with the vaccinations helping to keep us safe, many are hesitant about returning.

However, that doesn't stop us from sharing what we've got. We have an active Food Bank locally and although collecting tins and packets here at St John's has had to stop, we can still pop items into the Food Bank containers in the supermarkets, or make donations direct (St Albans and District Food Bank, c/o 5 Browning Road, Harpenden, Al5 4TS).

Paul's prayer for the Ephesians is for us today as well. He longed that we too ("all generations": v.21) should be strengthened with power through the Spirit of Christ, and that Christ may dwell in our hearts through faith, as we are being rooted and grounded in love. And then he goes on: that we may have the power to comprehend, with all the saints, what is the breadth and length and height and depth, and to know the love of God that surpasses knowledge – in other words it's not just what goes on in our heads, our hearts need to be involved as well. Why does he pray this for us? So that we may be filled with all the fulness of God!

The five thousand had their physical hunger filled that day as they sat on the hillside listening to Jesus, and no doubt hoped to see more of the miracles they were hearing about. That was just a pin prick in time. Paul's prayer stretches out over the centuries, into eternity even. So, as we come together with the freshness of release from serious lockdown, let us find ways of living God's love with generosity and joy – our ideas, time, money, friendship – within the life of St John's as we look forward to Tim's coming and his ministry with us.
