THE CHRISTMAS SEASON

The season of **Christmas** encompasses the Sundays immediately following Christmas up to the feast of the Epiphany and the Baptism of Christ. It is a time when we particularly rejoice in the presence of God with us in the Child of Bethlehem, and seek to worship him with the faithfulness of Saint Joseph, the devotion of Our Lady Mary, the joy of the angels, the humility of the Shepherds, and the perseverance of the Wise Men.

The first Sunday after Christmas is sometimes kept as a celebration of the **Holy Family**, mindful all the while of our own families and the complexity and frailty of human relationships. Our Lord knew the challenges and joys of a real human family, and the Holy Family fled to Egypt where they lived for some time. Christ shared the experience of all oppressed people, all who are forced to seek refuge because of war, violence and persecution, of which there are so many still in our world today.

The second Sunday after Christmas falls around the feast of the **Epiphany**, which means 'showing' or 'revealing'. During this time, the Christmas 'stable' of Luke's Gospel is gives way to the Epiphany 'house' described by Saint Matthew. It is the epiphany of the Wise Men which is most famous, but the Church also remembers the epiphanies of Christ's Baptism and Christ's first miracle at the Wedding at Cana in which he 'revealed his glory'. Christ continues to reveal his glory in the world today through lives transformed by grace, and like the Wise Men we 'open our treasure chests' to offer to him our gifts, so that we might receive back so much more through His love for us.

The fullness of the Christmas season is often said to continue until the feast of Candlemas on 2nd February, the last of the celebrations of the infancy and boyhood of Christ, and many churches keep some elements of Christmas decoration up until this time.

A prayer to say before the service:

Lord Jesus, our Master, go with us while we travel to the heavenly country; that, following your star, we may not wander in the darkness of this world's night, while you, who are our Way, and Truth, and Life shine within us to our journey's end. Amen.

THE NICENE CREED

WE believe in one God, the Father, the Almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is, seen and unseen.

We believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of one Being with the Father; through him all things were made. For us and for our salvation he came down from heaven (bow) was incarnate from the Holy Spirit and the Virgin Mary and was made man. For our sake he was crucified under Pontius Pilate; he suffered death and was buried. On the third day he rose again in accordance with the Scriptures; he ascended into heaven and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again in glory to judge the living and the dead, and his kingdom will have no end.

We believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life, who proceeds from the Father and the Son, who with the Father and the Son is worshipped and glorified, who has spoken through the prophets.

We believe in one, holy, catholic, and apostolic Church. We acknowledge one baptism for the forgiveness of sins. We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come. *Amen.

THE EUCHARISTIC PRAYER

The Lord be with you And also with you.

Lift up your hearts.

We lift them to the Lord.

Let us give thanks to the Lord our God. It is right to give thanks and praise.

All glory and honour be yours always and everywhere, mighty creator, ever-living God.
We give you thanks and praise for your Son, our Saviour Jesus Christ, who for love of our fallen race humbled himself, and was born of the Virgin Mary by the power of your Spirit, and lived as one of us.

In this mystery of the Word made flesh you have caused his light to shine in our hearts, to give knowledge of your glory in the face of Jesus Christ. In him we see our God made visible and so are caught up in the love of the God we cannot see.

Therefore with all the angels of heaven we lift our voices to proclaim the glory of your name and sing our joyful hymn of praise:

HOLY, holy, holy Lord, God of power and might, heaven and earth are full of your glory. Hosanna in the highest! *Blessed is he who comes in the name of the Lord. Hosanna in the highest!

How wonderful the work of your hands, O Lord. As a mother tenderly gathers her children, you embraced a people as your own. When they turned away and rebelled your love remained steadfast.

From them you raised up Jesus our Saviour, born of Mary, to be the living bread, in whom all our hungers are satisfied. He offered his life for sinners, and with a love stronger than death he opened wide his arms on the cross.

On the night before he died, he came to supper with his friends and, taking bread, he gave you thanks. He broke it and gave it to them, saying: Take, eat; this is my body which is given for you; do this in remembrance of me.

At the end of supper, taking the cup of wine, he gave you thanks, and said:
Drink this, all of you; this is my blood of the new covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins.
Do this, as often as you drink it, in remembrance of me.

Great is the mystery of faith: Christ has died.
Christ is risen.
Christ will come again.

Father, we plead with confidence his sacrifice made once for all upon the cross; we remember his dying and rising in glory, and we rejoice that he intercedes for us at your right hand.

Pour out your Holy Spirit as we bring before you these gifts of your creation; may they be for us the body and blood of your dear Son.

As we eat and drink these holy things in your presence, form us in the likeness of Christ, and build us into a living temple to your glory. Remember, Lord, your Church in every land. Reveal her unity, guard her faith, and preserve her in peace.

Bring us at the last with our Lady Mary, John, Alban and all the saints to the vision of that eternal splendour for which you have created us;

through Jesus Christ, our Lord, by whom, with whom, and in whom, with all who stand before you in earth and heaven, we worship you, Father almighty, in songs of everlasting praise:
